

Leadership: Students, Teachers & Community

Students:

FCCLA – facilitates service projects within our school and school community to help those in need.

GSA – bring awareness and promote service opportunities for *all* students to promote a culture of acceptance in our school and in our community.

Key Club – facilitates and participates in service opportunities throughout school and the community by cooperating with the Kiwanis Club.

National Honor Society – facilitates and participates in service opportunities in school and in the community to promote student leadership of the academic membership.

Student Council – organizes and facilitates positive opportunities for student involvement in service opportunities to improve the school culture.

TREND – promotes positive decision making for students in an effort to show respect for life in the face of drugs, alcohol, and social pressure.

Teachers:
